IT'S BEEN HARD HERE IN GREENWOOD

With eight children at home, there's no room to miss a paycheck, but that's exactly what happened to Mandy. "I missed over 300 hours of work because of COVID," she said. As a healthcare worker, "I was in and out of work. I was working at the prison, but if you come in contact with anybody with COVID, you had to be out of work for days regardless if you had symptoms or not," Mandy explained.

As a truck driver, her husband worked tirelessly to bring in as much as he could to make up for Mandy's lost income, but that was still not enough to feed their family. So, sacrifices had to be made. When asked if she missed any meals, Mandy replied, "I always let the kids eat and my husband eat, and then I eat what's left. We just didn't get to fix as much as we normally do. Let's put it that way."

Illness, job loss, disasters, and other unforeseen circumstances have threatened the health of thousands of children in our service area, like Mandy's family. Add summers without food support in schools, and even more children suffer tremendously because they don't know where their next meal is going to come from, if at all.

Because of your support, Mandy was able to get the food she and her family needed at a Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina food distribution at the YMCA in Greenwood, South Carolina.

With relief on her face, Mandy said, "This helps us tremendously. There are a lot of people missing work, a lot of people have had to be on unemployment. It's been hard here in Greenwood."

Clifford's wife has been ill and underwent major surgery. "Recovery is going to take probably two or three more months," he said. "So basically, I'm the only breadwinner right now."

Their two incomes were sufficient, but just one has put a huge burden on their ability to make ends meet. The stress of Clifford's wife's condition was compounded when he was laid off. "Well, I was without work for a few months because of the impact of COVID," he said.

Despite overwhelming challenges, Clifford never gave up. A repair technician by trade, he was determined to get back to work and take care of his wife. Even so, fear and insecurity were starting to chip away at Clifford's confidence and any hope that he could turn things around. But thanks to your deep kindness, hope returned to Clifford when he learned about a food distribution that Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina was holding. Here he was able to get the food he and his wife urgently needed. "It helps out because it's less of our budget that we have to put for food, so we can use it for other expenses we have," he said. Unfortunately, COVID has kept that to a minimum. That's when despair could creep in. "He's donated plasma when we really needed the money. He's really done more than anybody has done for me my whole life and we work as a team to get things done. We work together to find a way to make money," Alejandra said.

Sometimes their teamwork means real sacrifice. "As long as my child eats, that's what matters to me," Alejandra said. "Me and my husband, we can go without but if he's good, we're good."

Resourcefulness and sacrifice are essential when things get tough. Sometimes, even that's not enough.

"At one point, it was really bad to where I had to go to Social Services and have bills paid and then come here to SOCKS, because I just didn't have enough in the house to feed us," she said.

Thanks to your compassion for young families like Alejandra's, they're able to get the groceries they desperately need through SOCKS Crisis Ministry, one of our agency partners in Gaston County.

"When a child doesn't get the nourishment they need, they do very poorly in school because they're just hungry," Claudia said with a heavy heart. "They can't focus on their studies," David added.

To everyone who supports Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina so volunteers like the Doritys can get food to those who need it most, Claudia said, "It's a wonderful investment on their part."

David championed his wife's words, "We appreciate what you all do, and I say that — on this side of the fence — you all do a lot of good, and we thank you for that."

He continued, "Many may never see the ripple effect of what Second Harvest is doing and how they're impacting so many homes and families. People lined up, waiting for a bag of food, and when they leave, they've got a smile on their face." "And a little more security," Claudia echoes.

"Matthew 25 talks about what you do for the least of these, and one of those things is feeding someone who's hungry," David said with conviction. "It's putting wheels to that scripture."
