But the demand for drywallers has slowed considerably, which puts Feliciano in a tough spot. "I'm not getting enough hours at work right now," he says.

A hard-working father of two children, 11 and 13 years old, Feliciano and his wife are struggling to feed their family and pay their bills. Sometimes they can't do both, putting him in a tough situation. They need both, but can only afford food or bills. To make ends meet, he and his wife eat less, so their children will have enough.

Because of growing inflation, and the rising costs of food, Feliciano is concerned for his family and worries about where the next meal is going to come from. And what about tomorrow? If he doesn't get solid work soon, how will he provide just the basic needs for his wife and children?

Hourly workers are among the highest who suffer from food insecurity in our service area. Mainly because their work schedule can become inconsistent or completely cut off at a moment's notice. Overnight, this can spiral a family out of control and take years to get back on their feet.

Thanks to your ongoing generosity, struggling families who are out of work or underemployed, like Feliciano's, can get the help they urgently



need at mobile food pantries like Nations Ford Elementary. Here, they are greeted with truckloads of nutritious food to take home and help bring stability in their family.

The Food Bank's most recent fiscal year ended on June 30, 2024.

The end of the year is always a time for us to reflect and see how well we did on achieving our primary goals. This year we went a step further and reviewed our progress since 2004.

The chart below shows our performance in several key categories for the 2023-2024 year, and for the past 21 years.
